Organization Background

The Wildlife Conservation Society (WCS) is a US-headquartered non-profit, tax-exempt, private organization established in 1895 that saves wildlife and wild places by understanding critical issues, crafting science-based solutions, and taking conservation actions that benefit nature and humanity. With more than a century of experience, long-term commitments in dozens of landscapes, presence in more than 60 countries, and experience helping to establish over 250 protected areas across the globe, WCS has amassed the biological knowledge, cultural understanding and partnerships to ensure that vibrant, wild places and wildlife thrive alongside local communities. The WCS Country Program in Cambodia, is a relatively large, vibrant program with long-term programs in four major forested and/or wetland landscapes: Eastern Plains (Keo Seima Wildlife Sanctuary), Northern Plains, Major Rivers, and Tonle Sap.

Background

In Cambodia, illegal hunting and trade continue to impact freshwater turtle and tortoise species despite protection efforts. The critically endangered Southern River Terrapin and Cantor's Giant Softshell Turtles are both threatened by illegal hunting and trade with current approaches not addressing the root causes of illegal trade and being ineffective in preventing continued population declines.

Purpose of position

WCS Cambodia has received funding to implement a project entitled "Developing a problem-oriented approach to reduce turtle trafficking in Cambodia". The project aims to produce a comprehensive evidence base for the development and implementation of a crime prevention-based approach to prevent poaching and trafficking of freshwater turtles.

The project will deliver two outputs:

- i. a detailed understanding of at least two specific turtle trade chains including identification of drivers and opportunities for crime prevention
- ii. strategic interventions to prevent turtle poaching, trade, and consumption developed through a multi-stakeholder approach including Government, communities, and civil society.

Duties and responsibilities

The Research Lead will be responsible for overseeing the implementation of the research component of the project. His/her tasks include:

- Develop a research workplan for the project that ensures delivery of project outputs effectively and on time.
- Compile existing information on turtle poaching, trade and consumption from online open-source research, patrol records, capture records, voluntary reports and records of enforcement and judicial action.
- Identify knowledge gaps, gather and analyse new information on turtle poaching, trade and consumption, through field surveys and discussions with local community members in Sre Ambel, Kratie and Stung Treng, and additional research where needed.
- Produce at least two crime scripts based on the information collected and analysed.
- Participate in local meetings or workshops with stakeholders.
- Develop a crime prevention strategy based on the workshop outcomes.
- Produce a case study or research paper.
- Provide guidance to the Research Assistant for data collection and analysis.

The following deliverables will be produced:

- Research reports and project specific reporting requirements
- At least 2 crime scripts for turtle species (training will be provided on this approach)
- A crime prevention strategy
- Case study or research paper outlining approach and findings

Skills and qualifications

Required:

- Degree (Bachelor required, Master's desirable) in criminology, conservation, law, social sciences or other topic relevant to this work.
- Experience in conducting qualitative research, including interviews and focus group discussions.
- Highly organized with an ability to work independently and as part of a remote team.
- Proven analytical skills.
- Able and willing to travel regularly to remote areas.
- Excellent communication and collaboration skills.
- Experience writing research reports.
- Full professional proficiency of English and Khmer language, including writing.

Desirable:

- Familiarity with wildlife crime in Cambodia, including current approaches to counter wildlife trafficking.
- Experience in conducting qualitative research on sensitive topics.
- Experience with problem-oriented and situational crime prevention models and techniques.
